Through their engagement in MYP Core classes, our students have showcased their commitment to holistic education and the development of essential skills for success in an ever-changing world. 

IB Retreat & Group 4 Projects




The Years 12 & 13 participated in unique outdoor learning retreats to enhance collegial and independent learning skills, the Year 12 trip was held at Longbeach Campground and Year 13 students went to Double Tree by Hilton, both resorts were in in Ras al Khaimah. These retreats also brought students and faculty together as a community with shared goals in promoting well-being through a range of exciting outdoor pursuits such as kayaking, paddle boarding, archery and an array of water sports, as well as movie nights, live performances, quizzes and musical numbers. Also our students conducted a wide range of experiments facilitated by the Science Department for the Group 4 Project which helped students enrich their critical thinking through independent inquiry-based learning. Many of our students and faculty have heralded the retreat as being forever embedded as a highlight of their journey at DIA-EH.















STEAM Projects

First Lego League-Brazil

It all began in early December for the school when 10 students, Soumyo Shankar, Atharv Bansal, Rishabh Mittal, Parthav Karthikeyan, Domekveer Chopra, Zain Mumtaz, Selin O., Erkin O. and Ibtisam Waheed came together to form the "DIA Wolves Robotics Team". These students completed their robotics training during an after-school activity, the goal was to build a strong core robotics team that could be a front runner at any and all major robotics competitions.

First Lego League is the largest robotics competition in the world with about 300,000 teams participating every year with 30,000 teams. Every year, a theme is released and the teams' job is to identify a problem within the given theme and solve it using technology. The team also needs to prepare for a "Robot Game" where they build LEGO robots to autonomously solve timed missions on a standardized game field. This year's theme was "Cargo Connect" where students were challenged to improve global logistics and supply chain issues.

After consulting with experts from DNATA and logistics consultants, they found a problem endemic to the Middle East- Faded Barcodes. They built an Al Algorithm which can detect faded barcodes on packages, remove them and paste a replacement barcode on the package. This was a novel solution to an unusual and often overlooked problem.

At the Dubai Regional Round, they were heralded the Champions whilst also picking up a Runner Up award for the Robot Game. At the National Round, they were the Runner Up Champions, being granted an award for their Robot Game. Finally, they also secured the prestigious honor of representing the UAE at the International Finals in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil from 5-7 August 2023.

While preparing for their presentation in Rio de Janeiro, the team met with various other experts and possible stakeholders in the project, the local community and the government. They presented their solution to the local community at DI@Tech, the annual technology and innovation event hosted by DIA. They also visited CodersHQ, Dubai Future Labs and the Musuem of the Future as well as having the privilege of meeting the Minister of AI himself Omar Al Olama.

Finally, the flagbearers for the UAE left for FLL Brazil a 24-hour journey later, the team made it to Rio. The competition was strong; 84 teams from 32 different countries. They competed against the ferocious might of the Japanese, German and Korean teams, considered to be the FLL front-runners for over a decade. DIA Wolves spent 3 days at the competition presenting to the judges and participating in various social events, as well as meeting other teams to understand their design philosophies culminating in the team being given the "Best Innovation Project". They were the only school present to represent the UAE, and then marvelously now being bestowed with the Best Innovation Project in the world. The DIA Community has always tried to create an environment that fosters innovation and promotes individual creativity. The team were extremely thrilled when news broke of the win.



Year 13 students participated as members of Innoventures Education Incubator Programme which encourages students to think laterally and find solutions to real- world and futuristic concerns.

STEAM Project Lunar

Mehul Vemareddy, Prateeti Saran, Umar Ingalls, Soumyo Satyanarayanan, and Kshiteez Panigrahi constructed a lightweight lunar rover prototype which can move at a top speed of 30km per hour. The rover's rear is controlled by an electric DC motor which works through a throttle at the front and is constructed with a regular steering setup which could be found on any kart or car. Students sourced materials largely from local companies in the UAE, but also the borrowed equipment and sourced some parts from suppliers in China.

The distinctive feature of this lunar porotype is it is controlled with a stepper motor, which allows it to be controlled remotely. Furthermore the students also built the rover's accessories, including a solar panel and a robotic arm designed to collect samples from the lunar surface. In the future, they have considered incorporating artificial intelligence into the 80kg machine so it can complete missions autonomously.

During the vehicle's construction students were afforded the opportunity to be guided by the Dubai Future Labs and the Ministry of State for Artificial Intelligence, the students were able to assemble their rover prototype in three months. They even held an event to showcase the working model. The students relished the opportunity to combine their collective skills in applying mechanical theory, programming and design to conceptualise and then construct their pro-type a rich celebration of inquiry and independent learning.










Year 12 CORE DAY &

Introduction to the Maths IA The Year 12 Students participated in a day dedicated to the core aspects of the DP Programme such as the Extended Essay and TOK, as well as the Reflective Project for CP Students. Students engaged in a seminar focussed on research methods and how to effectively cite sources using MLA9. They were also shown how to responsibly use ChatGPT and how to effectively reference this as a source. Later in the day, students were introduced to the Maths IA by members of the department, to offer suggestions, lines of possible inquiry, organisation structure and they reiterated some of the potential obstacles the students may encounter and how to overcome these. 
